

RESOLUTION

Judge Carroll H. Wild, died, of heart failure, on Friday, November 7, 1997, at the Waverly Municipal Hospital. He was born on August 10, 1909, in Allison, Iowa, the son of Herman and Eva Wild. He graduated from the Allison High School in 1927 and received his BA Degree and Phi Beta Kappa at the University of Iowa in 1931. He received his legal education at the Harvard Law School, graduating with a JD Degree in 1934. He practiced law in Allison and was married to Dorothy J. Rath of Ackley, Iowa, on June 7, 1938. On August 30, 1943, he entered the U.S. Navy, serving in the Pacific during WW II and was discharged as a Lieutenant on January 24, 1946, when he returned to Allison to continue his practice of law. He served as Butler County Attorney from 1941 to 1943 and from 1948 to 1949.

In 1955, Carroll H. Wild was elected an Iowa District Court Judge for the 12th Judicial District, now sub-district 2A. In 1960, the Wilds moved within the 12th Judicial District, from Allison in Butler County to Waverly in Bremer County. Because Bremer County is a peninsula between two counties in the 1st Judicial District, there was serious debate as to placement of Bremer in the redistricting process. The legislative representatives of the counties in the new 2nd Judicial District worked overtime to keep Judge Wild in their district...and therefore, Bremer County. Judge Wild was the first chief judge of the Second Judicial District which was formed with the redistricting which took place in 1969. He served as chief judge until 1976. He launched district administration and set up the magistrate courts in each of the 22 counties of the large new district. Judge Wild retired from the bench in 1978. Upon his retirement he joined the law firm of

Englebrecht, Ackerman & Hassman as "of counsel", a position he held until his death.


Judge Wild was an active supporter of the Iowa Judges Association and at our meetings was usually in the company of his close friend, Judge John Stone. Judge Wild was a member of the Iowa Commission on Judicial Qualifications from 1973 to 1979. He was a member and past chairman of the Iowa Commission on Uniform Court Instructions having served on the Commission from 1960 to 1981. He was a member of the Iowa State Bar Association and was a member of its Board of Governors (1965-1967).

Judge Wild is survived by his wife, Dorothy, of Waverly; his two sons and their families, John and Virginia Wild of Waverly, and their son, Anthony who is serving with the U.S. Navy; William and Kathi Wild and their son, Brandon, all of Northbrook, Illinois.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE AND IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that the Iowa Judges' Association has suffered a great loss with the death of Judge Carroll H. Wild. The members of the association express their sympathies to his wife, Dorothy, and the surviving members of his family.
